Applies to Both Spur and Cane Pruning





Mistake #1


Starting with a weak foundation



Scenarios from the Ground Up

1st Year Growth – Single Shoot

Fruiting wire





Scenarios from the Ground Up

1st Year Growth – Single Shoot




Dormant first year vine

Thin to one strong shoot

Prune back to two buds in winter (one bud if less than pencil size wood)







Scenarios from the Ground Up 1st Year Growth – Single Shoot to Single Trunk



Dormant first year vine



Thin to one strong shoot





Cut out lateral shoots & retain basal leaves on the main shoot


Retain trunk - cut 2-4" below wire if >3/8" thick. (Cut back to 2 buds if <3/8" wood)



Mistake #2

Cutting too close to the apical bud








Mistake #3

Extending new cordons too far





Cordon Development

3rd Year Growth – Single Shoot to Single Trunk Moderate to High Vigor



from just below the wire & remove lower shoots


partial cordons (extend following year if needed)

Begin with a strong trunk, <3/8th inch [9-10 mm] thick wood



Cordons should be no longer than 15" or from "elbow to fist" in length







Scenarios from a Trunk & Partial Cordons Develop Full Cordons – Second Phase











Canes longer than 15" can cause gaps





Canes longer than 15" can cause gaps







Gap in the Canopy



Each 10 inch gap can result in loss of up to 1/2 ton fruit per acre

I'm serious about this one!

EN

3/8"



Trim away from distal, downward bud







Downward bud forms shoot along the wire





Mistake #4

Using lateral canes as spurs



Remove all wimpy wood

Good canes but weak laterals



Remove this bud & weak lateral





Cut out all wimpy wood – leave base bud

Lateral less than pencil diam.



Cut back to base bud





Spur Development





No wimpy wood!



Laterals not ideal for spurs





Clean prune new canes to push base buds = stronger spurs





Long laterals are even worse!





Mistake #5

Retaining weak or wimpy wood



Wimpy wood wrapped around the wire







Reduce weak spurs to 1 bud if needed





Cutting back to good wood

Extension weak – poor wood

Cut out weak wood – extend strong





Not removing dry, dead wood

Cutting too close on 2-3-year-old wood















'Spur Sandwich'

Don't waste time with poorly sized and positioned canes


